ERI at MEBIS in Dubai



In September 2018, ERI attended the Middle East Banking Innovation Summit held in Dubai. Humanitarian Contribution Electricity for Namasyolo primary school in Uganda

Namasyolo primary school, located in the Busia district, is currently attended by 778 students (459 boys and 319 girls), 200 of whom are orphans or otherwise vulnerable. It is the only primary school in the region and serves 16 villages. The school is roughly 10 km from the nearest source of electricity.

It has 16 rooms (10 classrooms, 3 offices and 3 additional rooms) and 12 full-time teaching staff.

Last year, only 40 students passed their national exams; on average, about 35 students start secondary school each year. Over 150 students attend night sessions, whether to receive help with their homework, to read or to study for their exams.



However, because there is no mains electricity or lighting, families are charged \$10 a month to pay for kerosene and candles. As well as the cost being prohibitive, students risk inhaling toxic fumes, experiencing impaired vision and developing severe coughs. ERI supported the village of Namasyolo through Innovation Africa, a charity specialising in bringing solar energy to villages in Africa.

A team from ERI visited Namasyolo to help install solar panels on the roof of the school. They had the honour of witnessing the priceless moment of joy when the classroom lit up for the first time!
